## Purpose of the Study

Positive school climate is an essential component of successful and effective schools. It is defined as shared beliefs, values, and attitudes that shape interactions among students, teachers, and administrators, while setting the parameters of acceptable behavior and norms for the school.

The Ann Arbor Public Schools (AAPS) School Quality Survey asked parents, staff members, and students in grades 3-12 for feedback on dimensions of school climate. Results will be used to inform school and district decisions.

K12 Insight partnered with district team members to develop the survey, which addressed the following topics:

- Overall school quality
- Academic preparation
- Student support
- School leadership
- Family involvement
- Safety and behavior
- Equity
- Cultural pedagogy

This was the first year parents, staff members, and students in grades 6-12 completed K12 Insight's benchmark School Quality Survey. Students in grades 3-5 completed a simplified survey. This year's results should serve as baseline data for the district. It should be noted that students in grades 3-5 are not included in comparisons by respondent type since they did not use the same vertically aligned instrument as the other respondent groups.

The district added questions about equity and cultural pedagogy.

## Details of the Study and Understanding the Results

The survey was open from April 2 to May 7.

Email invitations with unique survey links were sent to staff members and parents. Reminders were sent on April $10,17,24$, and 29 , and May 1 and 6.

Students used their student IDs to access the survey in school.

Pre-survey communications included a morning announcement, newsletter item, and social media posts.

This report summarizes survey results and breaks them down by parents, staff, and students in grades 6-12. A comparison of middle school and high school students is also presented. Participant demographic information is included in the appendix.

Results do not reflect random sampling; therefore, they should not be generalized to all parents, staff members, and students in grades 3-12. Rather, results reflect only the perceptions and opinions of survey participants.

Findings for each item in the report exclude participants who did not answer. In charts and graphs, data labels less than 5 percent are not shown. Percentages may not total 100 due to rounding.

## Key Insights

- In 2019, Ann Arbor Public Schools (AAPS) received 16,448 responses from parents, staff, and students in grades 3-12 in its first administration of K12 Insight's benchmark School Quality Survey.
- Participating staff members had the most favorable perceptions of all of the dimensions of school quality, which mirrors the trend nationally. The highest agreement (combined percentage of strongly agree or agree responses) was in the dimension of cultural relevancy for staff ( $84 \%$ ), in school leadership and academic support for parents (both $77 \%$ ), and in student support for students in grades 6-12 (73\%).
- Four of the five highest ranking indicators for parents were in the family involvement dimension. A strong majority of participating parents strongly agreed or agreed that families are informed about school-sponsored activities ( $95 \%$ ), their school encourages families to volunteer $(93 \%)$, they feel welcome at their child's school (91\%), and staff members and families treat each other with respect ( $90 \%$ ). However, few parents said they are familiar with the district's policies and procedures for responding to inequitable treatment or acts of bias for students, staff, and families (51\%).
- The highest ranking indicators for staff spanned four dimensions of school quality - cultural relevancy, family involvement, safety and behavior, and student support. The strong majority of participating staff members said they know students' names (96\%), families are informed about school-sponsored activities (95\%), and teachers are aware of what they should do in the event of an emergency (95\%). District and school leaders may want to further unpack staff perceptions in two areas for the 2019-2020 school year. Approximately 1 in 3 participating staff members disagreed or strongly disagreed that their school is meeting the needs of all students ( $34 \%$ ) and that discipline is enforced fairly (33\%).


## Key Insights (Continued)

- $90 \%$ of participating students in grades 6-12 said that there is a teacher, counselor, or other staff member to whom a student can go for help with a school problem and that teachers are aware of what they should do in the event of an emergency. However, approximately half of participating students in grades 6-12 disagreed or strongly disagreed that classroom activities are related to their personal interests (51\%) and that teachers successfully show students how lessons relate to life outside of school (49\%).
- It should also be noted that $52 \%$ of participating students in grades 3-5 said their classroom activities are sometimes or never related to their personal interests.
- The district should consider administering a Student Inventory Survey in the fall of 2019-2020. The survey would ask students in grades 3-12 about their personal interests to ensure instruction is related to those interests in order to improve engagement.
- Highest ranking indicators for students in grades 3-5 were in the school quality dimensions of safety and behavior and academic support. A strong majority of participating students in grades 3-5 said they know their school's safety and security drills (94\%), they know what to do in the event of an emergency ( $92 \%$ ), their teachers expect them to do their very best ( $89 \%$ ), they are learning what they need to know to be successful in the next grade ( $84 \%$ ), and they feel safe at school ( $82 \%$ ).
- More than two-thirds of participating parents of high school students indicated their child participates in advanced classes. Of those, the majority said their child takes AP or accelerated classes (both 68\%). More participating Asian parents ( $79 \%$ ) indicated that their child participates in advanced classes than participating black parents (46\%). In addition, Asian parents rated all but one of the district's cultural relevancy efforts (e.g., staff members taking time to learn about students' cultures, staff members working to connect with parents of cultural backgrounds different than their own, etc.) more favorably than parents of other races/ethnicities.
- $71 \%$ of participating parents indicated that their child participates in after-school activities. Participation varied by race/ethnicity, with $75 \%$ of participating white parents saying their child participates in after-school activities compared with $59 \%$ of participating Hispanic parents.


## Key Insights (Continued)

- The largest perception gap between racial/ethnic groups was in the dimension of equity, with $74 \%$ of participating Asian parents saying that the district distributes resources (i.e., materials and funds) based on the needs of the school and the school community in contrast with $50 \%$ of participating white and multiracial parents and $56 \%$ of participating black parents.
- Parents had the highest net promoter scores (NPS) of all the respondent groups. The gap in net promoter score was most pronounced between parents and students in grades 6-12. Participating parents had a school NPS of 37 and a district NPS of 49 compared with -13 and 10 respectively for participating students in grades 6-12.
- Comparing results of middle school and high school students found:
- High school students were more likely to say they are challenged by their schoolwork and their courses are rigorous than middle school students. While $84 \%$ of participating high school students said that students are challenged by their schoolwork, only $67 \%$ of participating middle school students said the same. There was a 26 percentage-point gap between participating middle school students (47\%) and participating high school students (73\%) who said their courses are rigorous. It should also be noted that $65 \%$ of participating students in grades 3-5 said their schoolwork is sometimes or never challenging.
- Participating middle school students were more likely to say that alcohol or other drugs are not a problem at their school (59\%) than participating high school students (35\%).
- There were marginal differences in agreement between participating middle school and high school students when looking at the dimensions of student support, school leadership, family involvement, equity, and cultural relevancy.

## Net Promoter Score - School

The school net promoter score (NPS) serves as a proxy for public confidence in AAPS schools and can potentially be connected to district growth. It is calculated by subtracting the percentage of detractors from the percentage of promoters, which gives a value between -100 and 100. A positive score means there are more people promoting AAPS schools than detracting from them.

K12 Insight researchers reviewed 10 percent of randomly selected comments provided by parents using the constant comparative analysis (CCA) method. CCA is an analytical approach where all units of data are compared with other units to discover properties and dimensions in the data.

## Please share any other thoughts you have about your experiences this year. ( $\mathrm{N}=2,247$ )

The highest percentage of parent responses were related to their satisfaction with their child's experience. Several participating parents said that their child attends a great school, praised staff members, and commented on the positive school climate.

Several parents said they would like to see an improvement in the interactions between students and teachers, as well as parents and teachers. This included creating a more inclusive environment for students and parents (e.g., at PTO meetings) and creating more opportunities for parent involvement.

Several parents said they would like to see a focus on maintaining and improving the safety of their child's school, including addressing student behavior like bullying and fights.

Several participating parents said how important it was to ensure all students have access to a quality education and a variety of school-based personnel to support their needs. This included having more support staff for students in the gifted and talented and special education programs. In addition, parents noted the importance of students having access to their school counselor.

A few parent responses were related to parents said there were too many snow days during the school year.
