Teacher	Amount Requested	Purchase Description	Principal Wright comments
Kindergarten (Crosby, Meier, Sandoe)	\$945 (\$690 for books, \$255 for kit)	The Kindergarten team would like to purchase the "Handwriting Without Tears" handwriting curriculum. We would like to purchase the handwriting and number workbook (1 book for each child, \$10 each). The workbooks would be good for one year as the kids would use them, but the mat man kit could be used every year. One kit is \$85 and each classroom would like one.	Teachers have all been teaching handwriting, but we have not had a consistent program. Part of the issue in the past has been having enough budget to purchase these materials. We would need to think about a long term way to keep these materials in our classrooms. It would be nice to have a consistent program though.
Tory Wubben (Art)	Prices will vary, drying racks vary from \$140-\$600	The purchase would be for a new (additional) drying rack for the art room. We have one small one, one broken one, and one we use a lot, but is beginning to break which limits the amount of making projects that need to dry in one day. The purchase would benefit the whole school, be used for multiple years and would remain at Logan.	These are very useful in the art room. I would like to have a more solid price.
Christopher Culbertson (ELL) in collaboration with Hillary Wooley (reading intervention)	Level A (late 1st grade & early 2nd grade reading level) Intervention Kit \$422.47, Level B (2nd grade reading level) Intervention Kit \$422.47, and Level C (3rd grade reading level) Intervention Kit \$422.27, TOTAL \$1267.41	Quickread Books are supplemental literacy intervention kits that target fluency, comprehension, and content knowledge for students. These researched based nonfiction texts are used for at risk students and English Language Learners to improve their literacy skills. This target group is 31 1st graders, 25 2nd graders and 15 3rd graders that would qualify to use these materials. These materials would be used over multiple years as they align with the school improvement plan and the Michigan Literacy Essentials. These materials would be housed and used at Logan Elementary by the Reading Interventionalist, English Language Teacher, and will be available to all classroom teachers.	This is very closely aligned to our school improvement work. We are working to design targeted and individualized support for every single student. This means "diagnosing" the needs of the student and matching the intervention to those needs. These materials have been demonstrated to improve students' fluency, an area we are attempting to address with this work.
First and Second Grade Teaching Team (Kristi Krite is point person)	\$2,250	All first and second grade classes would like to purchase six more refurbished iPads to share amongst the team. Our goal is to have six iPads in each of the 5 classrooms and we currently only have 24 iPads. These devices are a cornerstone teaching tool and drive so many important initiatives including Lexia that support our struggling readers. With a shortage of devices, we cannot meet the minimum amount of daily engagement. While we struggle to meet these demands, our higher functioning students get no time with the math and reading applications like RazKids, Epic and Storyline Online. Every 1st and 2nd grader (105 students) will benefit from this purchase. Our current iPads have been in use for over 5 years and we these should last just as long. The Lexia program is designed specifically for our struggling readers and rely heavily on iPad technology.	We are finding more and more ways to integrate technology into our instructional routines. Increasing the available technology helps improve our abilities to do this. We also added a first grade classroom this year. However, the district did not provide us with any additional technology. This means that we have to spread these resources across more classrooms.

Sarah Naurato - Logan SLP	~\$152	I am hoping to purchase a set of materials that will be made into "work boxes". Each box focuses on a different set of CORE words (words that we use in language the most - stop, go, in, out, that, this, etc.). The materials are simple, and for the most part inexpensive, but I would like to purchase all of them at one and take the time to assemble the work boxes correctly so that they will last quite some time for our students that need the most help with communication. See attached list of materials (range \$1-\$20 each).	Sarah is doing a ton to expand and improve our communication skills. She works closely with our three self-contained classrooms specifically to build tools to help students in these rooms communicate. These materials will help with this work.
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3rd Grade (Tierra Jackson & Natasha Stewart)	\$525	Color coded fraction circles (50 sets) - Rainbow fraction circles represent different fractions for instructive comparison. Teach students how to compare and construct fractions, work with mixed numbers and add/subtract fractions with like and unlike denominators. Color Coded fraction tiles (50 sets) - Rainbow fraction Tiles represent different fractions for instructive comparison. The fraction circles and strips will be used a teaching tool to facilitate teaching fractions. The colors are coordinated to those associated with our Everyday Math fraction colors used in our textbook. The are plastic (easy to clean and durable) and will be used at Logan for years to come. Using this tool this summer was amazingly helpful for students when we discussed and compared fractions. The grant is for 3rd grade, but could be used by students in 4th and 5th grades as well.	There is strong evidence that having "manipulatives" such as these help students better understand math concepts. Building a solid understanding of fractions is crucial. Kids understanding of fractions in early grades is fairly predictive of later success in math. These fraction circles provide a hands-on way to build student understanding of these concepts.
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Christie Lower (Music)	\$196	1 Sonar Primary Soprano Glockenspiel \$140, 3 sets of Basic Beat Yarn Mallets medium \$14 * 3, 2 sets of Basic Beat Glockenspiel Mallets \$7 * 2. All Logan students would use these materials for classroom instrument exploration and in grades 2-5 concerts. Items are usable over multiple years and remain at Logan.	Christie is really working to grow the music program and the number and types of instruments children are exposed to. This purchase would add instruments to grade 2 as well as add additional instrument learning in the upper elementary grades.

Registration and Donation Sheet

Academic Games is a series of games designed to develop and test a student's knowledge in several different subject areas beyond what is taught in school. Students compete in games that cover math, English, social studies, & logic. **The primary purpose of Academic Games is to make learning fun for students.** All too often it seems, students turn off to math, English, or social studies because the students are bored or not challenged by the material. Academic Games (AG) helps to alleviate that problem by challenging students to pursue their own education in these subjects in order to succeed in competition.

Academic Games team members are encouraged to attend a minimum of one practice a week, but are welcome to attend as often as they wish. This year the team will meet for practice in Ms. Jackson's classroom (Room 253) on Tuesday afternoons from 4:00 - 5:30 PM and on Thursday evenings from 6:00 - 7:30 PM.

All team competes against other schools from and throughout the state about once a month on Saturdays. The first Saturday tournaments will held on **September 29th**. This tournament will be held at **Ernest J. Dossin Elementary-Middle School in Detroit, MI**. A full schedule of this year's tournaments is included with this letter. Students will need transportation for all Saturday tournaments.

In order to be eligible for the (optional) three-day State Tournament in March, students must attend practice regularly, and must attend at least 3 Saturday tournaments by January. National competitors are selected from among those who compete at the State Tournament. The National tournament is held in late April. There is a cost to the student to travel to both of these competitions (roughly \$360 for the State tournament) as they stay in hotels and receive meals, but there is scholarship money available to qualifying students with financial need. More information about these tournaments will be passed out later in the season.

The team is coached by volunteers and supported through the efforts of many parents who act as co-coaches, chaperones, and fundraisers. We would like to encourage all parents to attend any and all practices and tournaments to learn the games, and help guide and coach the students throughout the year.
